
William "Bill" Lee

A Military burial service for Bill Lee was held on Wednesday, September 11, 2019 at 1:00pm at the Abraham Lincoln National Cemetery in Elwood Illinois (South of Joliet)- 20953 W Hoff Road, Elwood, IL 60421

Your words clearly show that you had a long and special connection with Bill.

- I'd have to say that Bill was an avid folk dancer.
- I can remember my parents and I dancing with Bill Lee as early as 1960 at the Hyde Park Neighborhood Club monthly FunNite activities.
- In the early the middle 1960s when I started going to Folk Dances at the University of Chicago [Ida Noyes Hall (Sundays & International House (Tuesdays)] and the Old Town School of Folk Music (Nate Lofton's Wednesday group), I remember seeing Bill there too.
- When Ed Stern and I started the Monday beginners group at Ida Noyes Hall in 1970, Bill was a regular attendee.

- When I was asked to re-start Folk Dancing at the Old Town School of Folk Music in the middle 1970s, Bill was a regular.
- When we moved folk dancing from the Old Town School to Jamnastics in the fall of 1981, Bill was there.
- When we resumed folk dancing at the Old Town School in the form of Wednesday night classes, sometime around 1984 or 1985, Bill was there.
- When Bill Sasso and I started the Mid North Group (now Ethnic Dance Chicago) at St Josaphat Church (in Lincoln Park) in 1987 or 1988, Bill was there.
- When Ethnic Dance Chicago moved to the Chicago Latvian Center in 2005, Bill was there.

- For many years, at St Josaphat and the Latvian Center, Bill would come early to help setup for the dance, sometimes starting setup without me.
- For many years, Bill was a regular dancer at Monday night group in Evanston.
- For several years in the middle to late 2000s, Bill was an enthusiastic attendee of the Madison Folk Ball, though I could never get him to consider attending the Door County Folk Festival or June Camp.
- Bill was also an enthusiastic participant at Chicago SummerDance activities whenever there was some kind of Folk Dance activity there.

- It's hard to imagine a Friday night dance at the Latvian Center without Bill.
- Bill did begin to cut back on his Friday dancing during bad weather in the winter of 2018-2019, but he did attend the 2018-2019 New Years' Eve Party at the Latvian Center.
- Towards the end of the Winter of 2019, Bill told me he had sold his car because he was tired of dealing with the snow and trying to find parking places after dancing.
- The demographics of the Lakeview neighborhood where he lived had changed to where there were just too many people attending bars late at night - people who took up all the parking places. Sometimes he would spend 30-40 minutes either looking for parking or shoveling his car in and out of snowbanks.

- Bill loved the Global Dance Parties we produced in conjunction with the Old Town School of Folk Music.
- He also liked to attend a number of ethnic music concerts at the school. I got Bill a complimentary ticket to see the excellent Sőndergő Tamburitza Group from Hungary on Sunday, April 7, 2019 and we ate dinner at Barba Yianni in Lincoln Square after that concert.
- We spoke several times about the Mayoral Elections this spring and exchanges thoughts about Lori Lightfoot versus Toni Preckwinkle.
- Bill Lee was a very private about his personal life and most people at dancing knew very little about him. Those who tried to pry were disappointed.

- Bill and I attended the same High School in Chicago (Tilden Tech) but many years apart.
- We often discussed a few teachers we had in common who were at Tilden when he went there and were still there when I went there.
- Bill also got to engage in lively conversations about Tilden Tech when my former HS Spanish teacher (John Cullen) who attended dances at the Latvian Center for a while.
- Bill was ahead of me at Tilden and never told me the year of his graduating class. He declined to attend any HS reunion activities with me.

- Bill served in the US Army in the 1950s. It's hard to imagine that the mild mannered Bill that we knew was a top-notch Drill Instructor (DI) in the military.
- When Bill's military commitment was up, the Army tried (in vain) all sorts of ways to get him to re-enlist and extend his tour. He refused adamantly, saying that his time for this was up.
- Bill served as a Social Worker for senior citizens of many different ethnicities for many years.
- He got a big kick out of telling some of his clients from various ethnic groups that he knew dances and songs and a few language phrases from their heritage.

- Bill was also an artist (painter and sketcher) who presented his art in shows in a number of galleries and art shows around Chicago.
- Bill also loved to travel to France to visit art galleries and museums there. I recall at least 2 or 3 summer trips that he made to France where he missed several weeks of dancing, but he always returned to dancing as soon as he was back from his travels.
- Bill was also an avid runner and bicyclist and spent a lot of time on the bike paths and running paths in Hyde Park and Lincoln Park.

- Bill also loved to travel to France to visit art galleries and museums there. I recall at least 2 or 3 summer trips that he made to France where he missed several weeks of dancing, but he always returned to dancing as soon as he was back from his travels.
- Bill was also an avid runner and bicyclist and spent a lot of time on the bike paths and running paths in Hyde Park and Lincoln Park.
- Bill had family in the Chicago area but between the City and County authorities who investigated his case, they were not able to locate any relatives.

- Bill passed away of a heart attack in his Lakeview condo sometime between the middle of May 2019 (the last time that I had spoken with him) and June 11, 2019 when the police and condo management officials went into his condo and found his body.
- I've looked through many photos and surprisingly only found a few that included Bill Lee. Photos I've found are at the beginning of this presentation.

- On occasion, when Bill would walk into dancing, I would play the 1957 rock 'n roll song "Mister Lee" by the Bobbettes. He would get a kick out of that.
- Paraphrasing a line from that song: "One, two, three, we miss you Mister Lee"
